Heading To College?

Starting college can be a fun and exciting time, but it can also be challenging. Here is an overview of helpful hints with the goal of making the transition a safe one for persons with epilepsy.

-Develop a plan with your doctor in case you have a seizure and outline it in writing so the key people at your school are aware of what to do (roommates, school nurse/physician)

-Take your medication consistently and make sure you have an adequate supply available. Remember your medication does not mix with alcohol, so please avoid it.

-Make sure to eat well and schedule your classes to get enough rest.

-Manage stress by trying some relaxation techniques like listening to music or taking a break with friends.

-When studying make sure to set enough time aside, find a quiet place, prioritize, and stay organized. Meet with your professors if you need help.

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Services Corner!

Services We Provide

In each newsletter we will spotlight one service provided by ESSNY/CPI. This time we will focus on service coordination.

What is a service coordinator and what services does s/he provide?

A service coordinator is an advocate. They work hard to get in place whatever services are available for the people with disabilities they serve (called consumers). The service coordinator is like the quarterback of the team of people who are available to help our consumer. As the point person on the team, they find and implement whatever services are available and needed to enrich the life of their consumer. Then the service coordinator manages the team to ensure the services are appropriate and are doing what they are intended to do.

Let's take a step back and see how this all works.

A consumer calls the Agency. A service coordinator will return the call and talk to the consumer about their personal situation. Maybe they want some information about the latest epilepsy drugs, or maybe they want information about services they may be eligible for. Sometimes the service coordinator will make an appointment to meet with the consumer face to face. Either way, the service coordinator is trying to match consumer needs with what social services may be available. Depending on the situation, the service coordinator may begin the work to determine eligibility for different programs offered by New York State.

Some programs that may be considered for eligibility include the Home and Community Based Waiver Program which offers such services as respite care and residential habilitation or the Traumatic Brain Injury Program which offers such services as independent living skills training, and community integration counseling, among others.

After the consumer's eligibility/enrollment process is completed, the service coordinator secures benefits and entitlements for the consumers under the programs. In order to accomplish this, they must navigate the systems and services of Social Security, Medicaid, food stamps, and housing subsidy programs. So.....a service coordinator is a professional who is creative, compassionate, and resourceful with a strong commitment to helping individuals with disabilities. They play an important role in the life of the consumer. Partnering with various other service providers, the service coordinator ensures that the consumer has what is necessary to live a rewarding life.

ESSNY has over 8 service coordinators on staff. Each has a strong commitment to the people s/he serves.

Consumer Advisory Council

The Consumer Advisory Council of the Epilepsy Society of Southern NY was established in 1997 by a group of individuals whose lives had been impacted by epilepsy in some way; whether directly or as a parent, spouse, or friend. The CAC's mission is to seek and adapt methods of advocating for individuals with epilepsy and their families through community and individual education and to promote quality care and quality of life through personal empowerment.

Sound intriguing? The members of the CAC provide valuable insight and feedback on consumer needs to us here at ESSNY. The CAC also helps to plan volunteer programs, activities, fundraisers, and special projects when meeting a few times a year.
